This course provides you with an overview of what digital barriers exist and how they can be reduced. You will also explore the basics and examples of accessible design of digital teaching and learning resources. Important: This course is an online-only course. 6 work units (AE) are acquired synchronously through 2 videoconferences and 2 AE are acquired through asynchronous self-study. The responsibility that teachers take on in their function as examiners is great, and so is the anxiety about it, especially among new teachers. Therefore, the workshop will focus on the following questions: What functions do different exams have? What do I have to consider when preparing, conducting and marking a competence-oriented examination? How can I design an examination so that it meets the test quality criteria, is legally error-free and is fair for both the examinee and the examiner? And what are the advantages and disadvantages of different forms of examinations with regard to competence orientation? The answers to these questions will help in the preparation, implementation and follow-up of a successful examination.</p> <p>The workshop takes place as an online seminar via Zoom. Input phases alternate with small group and individual work phases. In the run-up to the seminar, participants are introduced to the topic asynchronously through preparatory tasks two weeks before the seminar begins (3AEs). 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27.07.2023 09:00 - 17:00 Uhr	Using Humour in the Classroom	Online	TUM	This online workshop aims to help lecturers to use humour in the classroom successfully. We will discuss how humour can be used as a tool to boost content retention and to heighten our rapport with students. Although we will discuss some theory related to humour, the main design of the course is to be as practical as possible. It will provide participants with a range of techniques designed to bring fun and humour to the classroom, and participants will practise a number of techniques themselves through controlled exercises. As well as considering good practice, the course will also point out types of humour to avoid, including forms of humour that may be culturally inappropriate or offensive. By the end of the course, participants will feel more confident in integrating humour into their classroom activities in order to create a memorable learning environment.
